

QCAT Practice Direction No. 9 of 2025

LISTS

Updated 14 October 2025

PREAMBLE

1. Pursuant to Rule 5 of the QCAT Rules, the following are divisions of the Tribunal:
 - (a) The Human Rights Division
 - (b) The Administrative and Disciplinary Division
 - (c) The Civil Disputes Division.
2. This has been the case since the inception of the QCAT Rules.
3. For reasons of practicality and efficiency, the Administrative and Disciplinary Division and the Civil Disputes Division operate under the collective banner of the Civil, Administrative and Disciplinary Division ("CAD").
4. For reasons of operational need, some aspects of the Tribunal's work operates across Human Rights, Civil, and Administrative and Disciplinary, for example, Appeals.
5. For reasons of practicality and efficiency, the Tribunal conducts its work by operating lists within the divisions. These lists change from time to time depending on a number of factors. It is acknowledged that some lists contain work with elements which traverse both civil and administrative work.
6. Rule 5(3) provides that the President, may, by a practice direction, establish lists with each division of the tribunal.
