

Representation and appearance at QCAT: Differences between representation and appearance at QCAT

The Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal (QCAT) is an independent tribunal committed to actively resolving disputes in a way that is fair, just, accessible, quick and inexpensive.

The following table is a summary of the laws about who can represent and who can appear for a certain kind of party in the Tribunal.
